Eligibility is determined by each student's unique career interests, abilities, and credit needs, as determined by the sending district high school. <u>CEVEC is specifically designed to help students</u> move towards their employment, post-secondary training/education, and independent living goals.

Elective credit is determined by the program in which the student is enrolled. <u>Students may have</u> the opportunity to earn up to 3 elective credits/year.

Referral to CEVEC is made by the sending district personnel (Transition Coordinator/School Counselors/Pupil Services Directors).

In most cases, transportation is provided by the sending school district.

CEVEC Programs

Starting in 1980 with a handful of school districts and 14 students, the **Cuyahoga East Vocational Education Consortium (CEVEC)** has grown to 300 students/year coming from over 25 consortium member, and non-member school districts.

With 17 very unique programs taught by highly qualified Job Training Coordinators, Job Trainers, Social Worker, Career Assessment Specialist, and Intervention Specialists, students with an Individual Education Plan (IEP), 504 Plan, or just in need of specialized community-based instruction can find success.

CEVEC's unique focus is on helping high school students identify their preferences, interests, needs, and strengths. Students develop their critical work behaviors (CEVEC's 16 Power Standards) at one or more of CEVEC's 100 business partner locations.

In recent years, CEVEC has "evolved" in response to the needs of the member districts and has created new program offerings, such as the CEVEC Community Living Skills Program taught at a house in Mayfield Village, Alpha Academy alternative high school program, and a variety of both short-term and longer term training options leading to an industry recognized credential, which in Ohio is a new pathway to a high school diploma.

Many of the CEVEC programs offer a half, or a full day schedule. Additionally, depending on the needs of students referred, individualized and student specific programs can be developed.

Finally, CEVEC specializes in facilitating a seamless transition to adult service agencies for those students needing those supports.

Career Assessment Services

An individualized process to assist students in developing a plan for post-school success and enrollment into a CEVEC program.

Vocational Adjustment Lab

An in-house program (CEVEC Industries) that gives students their first opportunity to understand the importance of the 16 CEVEC Power Standards.

Innovative Options Program

A program for students with the need for a higher staff to student ratio. Multiple community based & in-house training opportunities.

Retail Options Program

Training at Goodwill Retail Stores, and other retail training sites.

Transition Options Program

Training at the Mandel Jewish Community Center, National Counsel of Jewish Women, and other community sites.

Community Employment Options

Training at the Cleveland Foodbank, Euclid Animal Shelter, TJ Maxx, Dave's Markets, Old Navy, Miles Market, Doubletree Hotel, and many other community sites.

Hospitality & Customer Service

Training at Ursuline College, Heinen's Grocery Stores, and Executive Caterers.

Career & Community Exploration

Training at Menorah Park Senior Living Center, Ahuja Medical Center, and Lifetime Fitness.

Computer Refurbishment & Accreditation

Students learn computer refurbishing, recycling, and the opportunity for Information Technology Certifications is also offered.

Community Mentorship Program

Training at Progressive Insurance, Richmond Medical Center, Dave's Markets, local elementary schools, various child care environments, and various senior care environments.

Community Based Internship Program

Housed at Rockwell Automation, Lander Elementary School, and other community training sites.

Health Careers Job Training/Internship Program

Students experience various aspects of healthcare-based occupations at Hillcrest Hospital, and may continue as interns at various Cleveland Clinic locations.

Jergens Manufacturing Program

Students experience various aspects of manufacturing at a world class manufacturing environment.

Job Development Services

Supporting students in job seeking, interview skills, and job retention services. This includes itinerant services.

Alpha Academy Alternative High School

An alternative high school program for students seeking a smaller learning environment. Virtual learning, social work services, career development & counseling, and mindfulness training all included.

Community Living Skills Program

Students learn the skills to live independently at a house located in Mayfield Village.
