




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Maps Part 1	
Legend/Key	Explains what each symbol on the map represents
Scale	Shows how much a map has been reduced from the area it represents. Tells what each distance on the map represents in real life.
Direction Indicator (Compass Rose)	Usually found somewhere on the edge of a map. It shows the four cardinal directions, which are North, East, South and West.
Cartographer	A person who makes maps
Relative Location	Where it is in relation to another place (example: our school, MMS, is north of the Eastgate Shopping Center on the east side of SOM Center Road.)
Types of Maps	

Political Map- shows boundaries and locations of countries, states, and major cities **Physical Map**- shows the geographic features of an area (seas, islands, mountains, lakes, rivers, deserts)

Topographical Map- a type of physical map that shows elevation (how high a place is above sea level)

Climate Map- shows the average monthly or yearly weather conditions

Population Density Map- shows the amount of people that live in an area relative to the space occupied by them

Product Map- shows the natural resources and the products made in that area
