Students gained experiences in fluid changes, inspections, diagnostics, brakes, suspension component replacements among many others.

One of the highlights from this school year was a project car that both the Junior and Senior classes had a chance to be involved in. In November students started work on a 2003 Ford Mustang Cobra. Students made several improvements to the car including suspension, chassis reinforcement, wheels and tires, a new Whipple supercharger and all the supporting modifications to nearly double the factory horsepower. The car was set to debut at the Piston Power Autorama in March but unfortunately the show was cancelled. We would like to thank several industry partners who helped make this project come together: Stainless Work, Maximum Motorsports, Injector Dynamics, Afco Racing, and Big3 Racing.

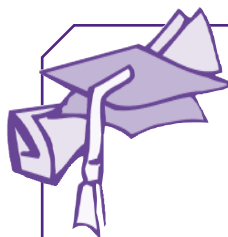

CADD Students Win in Challenging Times

We hope you and your family are doing well during these unprecedented times. CADD students were involved in several competitions and projects during the 2019-2020 school year, prior to schools closing in March.

Our program is a Community Chapter for e-Nable, a global network of makers who provide 3D-printed prosthetic hands at no charge to recipients. Students built practice prosthetic hands last October and displayed their work at Maker Faire Cleveland, held at the Great Lakes Science Center. The hands-on display allowed visitors to use the prosthetic hands and generated interest in our chapter. You can learn more about our history with 3D-printed prosthetics at facebook.com/enabletcadd.

In January, three CADD senior teams entered the always-competitive Student Model Home Design Contest. This year's theme was The Great Opportunity Zone Home and used an actual Opportunity Zone site in Cleveland. The team of Jacob Baraona, Jadon Guarniere, Adam Munday, Adara Tsirlin, and Bryan Westfall earned tenth place overall. Their project was on display throughout the Great Home and Garden Show in February, and the team was recognized on the main stage by HGTV's Matt Fox. The team of Joe Criniti, Michael Favazzo, Vince Favazzo, and Joey Stuart earned 3rd place in the Best Green Home award category.

CADD juniors were invited to participate in the L.E.A.F. Umbrella Project Engineering Challenge, sponsored by the Lake/Geauga Educational Assistance Fund. CADD students from our program and the Lakeshore Compact CADD program designed the fixtures to display umbrellas decorated by area high school students at Great Lakes Mall. Students had to focus on safety and durability, as well as preventing damage to the umbrella handles. Several CADD students are currently competing for scholarships for the engineering portion of this project.

A total of 12 CADD juniors and seniors were involved in preparations for the SkillsUSA Ohio State Championships prior to schools closing and the cancellation of the state championship event - our largest group ever. Senior Icarus Fernandes earned second place in the SkillsUSA Ohio North Central Regional Championships in the Architectural Drafting Contest and was preparing for the state contest. 2019 SkillsUSA Ohio State Champions and national qualifiers in the Additive Manufacturing contest, CADD seniors Luke Sarris and Joey Suchy, were preparing for this year's event, along with Michael Schwartz and teammate Adara Tsirlin. CADD senior Jimmy Rogant was also working with Construction Trades on an entry for the Career Pathways

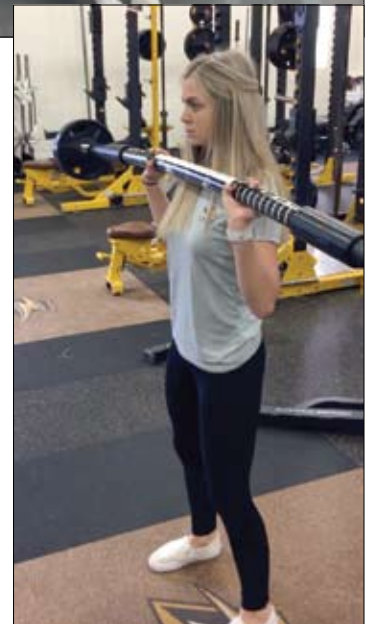

It's Kim Nye, the High School Nursing Instructor for the LPN program located at Northern Career Institute (NCI) –Eastlake. I hope you are all staying well during this time of uncertainty. Today, I'd like to share with you some of what the 19 junior LPN students and 15 senior LPN students have been doing while remotely learning.

At the start of the school year, both groups were introduced to the Popui and Remind platforms and we were utilizing them successfully on a daily basis. Once the stay-at-home order was instituted, I immediately added the Zoom platform and they have done a remarkable job utilizing all three. We have been able to continue with lectures, study guides and online testing while also meeting weekly as a group as though we were still in the classroom and they have maintained scores of 84% or higher. We have encountered a few glitches in the platforms along the way but the students have been so helpful to each other and to me and they have been more than patient. I can see real growth in these students which is exciting as they prepare for graduation.

While the students are currently studying for finals in nursing and in all of their homeschool classes, the senior students are also busy preparing for their ATI exit exams. These particular exams afford the students the opportunity to prepare to take the state NCLEX exam where they will earn their LPN license.

I am happy to announce that several senior LPN students have already sent applications to nursing homes and have been hired. Their goal is to work over the summer as a nursing aid not only to gain experience but to also secure a position as a nurse upon obtaining their LPN license.

I am proud to have instructed these young adults as they will go out and work as nurses to care for the sick especially during this time of crisis. I am excited to watch the senior students move to the next chapter in their lives while also pushing forward the junior students as they complete the school year. I am already looking forward to instructing the upcoming seniors and to be meeting the new junior students. I've started preparing for the next school year by continuing to make videos for future lectures and I also plan to learn more about the current platforms I am using so that I can be an expert during the next school year. The play follows a brave Scottish general named **Macbeth** who receives a prophecy from a trio of witches that one day he will become King of Scotland. Consumed by ambition and spurred to action by his wife, **Macbeth** murders King Duncan and takes the Scottish throne for himself. He is then wracked with guilt and paranoia.

Our production of Macbeth stars senior Zak Tahsin (Willoughby) as Macbeth, Gwendolyn Felton (Chagrin) as Lady Macbeth, Morgan Beck (Brush) as Lady Macduff, Sam Roter (Beachwood) as Banquo and Nathan Parks as Macduff. In addition there are 20 other actors from the Academy playing the many other roles.

During class hours, we learned about different skills needed for health care workers.

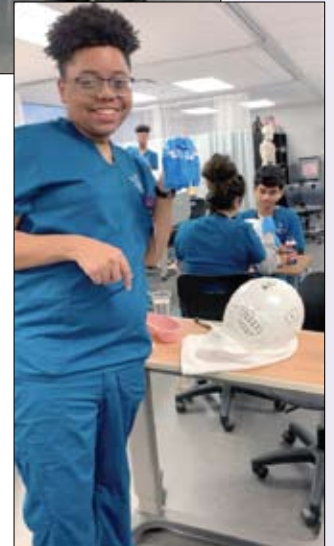

Willoughby Welding

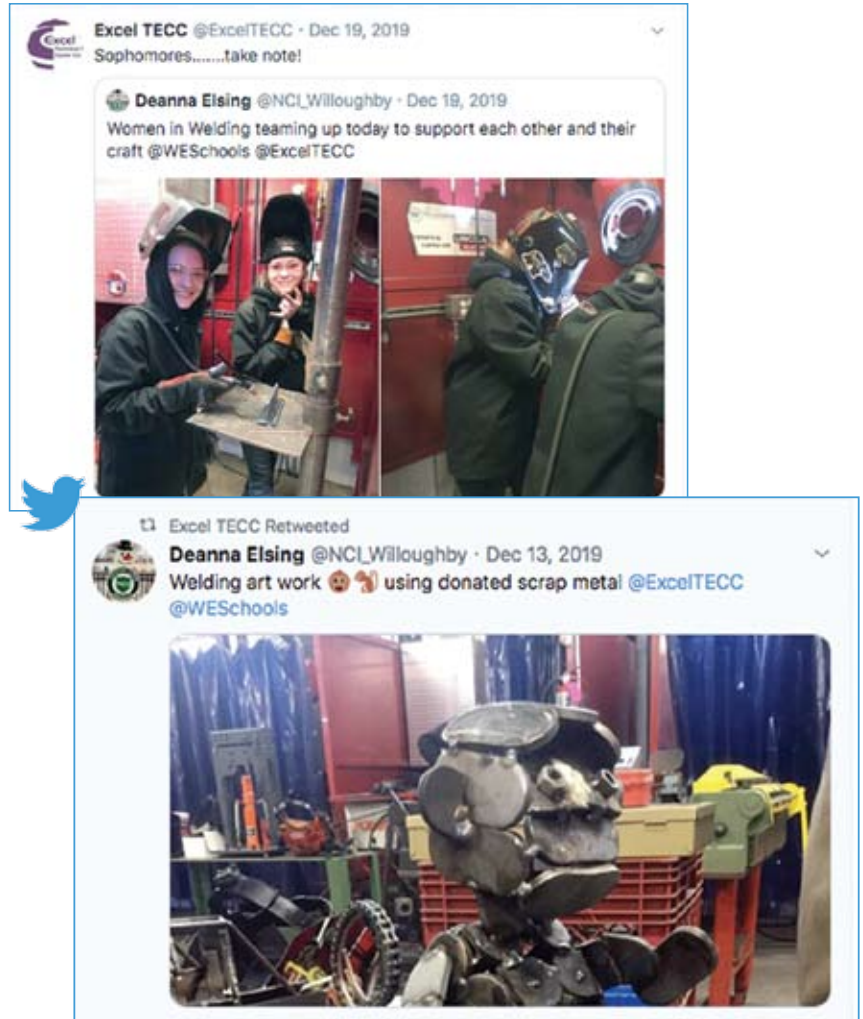

without having to physically send them to a business/industry location. This is a program that will become a mainstay of ITP, thanks to the work these students and adult partners have done in piloting this project for ITP.

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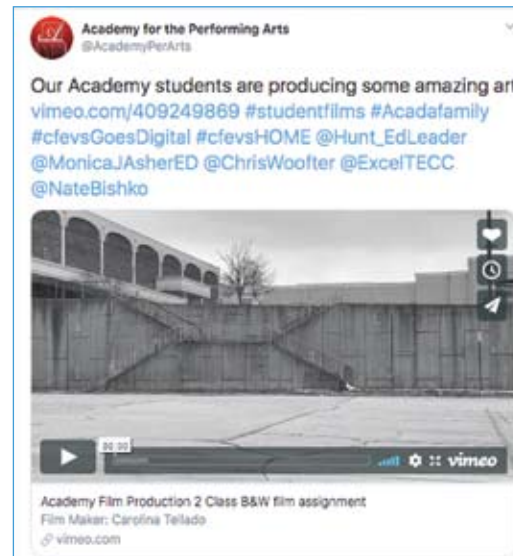
Senior Send-Off 2020

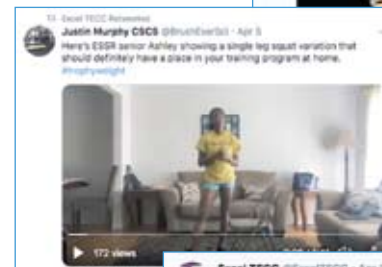
