### Floriculture and Gardening Operations: Kym Judson

Students have had the opportunity to work with staff at Beechmont Country Club; discuss vegetable gardening and make salsa with the Master Gardeners of Cuyahoga County; and discover Case Western Reserve's research farm, where they had the chance to tour the facility and discuss the farm's production with the CWR staff.

Fall is a busy time at the Center! Students have been working to create displays, cutting corn stalks and preparing the grounds for the Mayfield Schools Family Fall Festival held October 12 from noon – 4:00 p.m. The students are electing chapter FFA officers and learning parliamentary procedure, propagating plants for sale and completing fall clean-up projects.

Poinsettia cuttings and holiday plants are just being potted so they will be big and beautiful by the Holiday Open House which will be held Friday December 6 from 8 a.m. till 6 p.m. Please mark your calendars and come out to see what the students have created and grown for your holiday decorating needs!

### A.C.E. Program (Agriculture and Career Exploration): Becky Gardner

The students have been utilizing their outdoor skills creating Tee Pees for their Native American display and a giant bird's nest to be viewed during the hayride at the Family Fall Festival. The A.C.E. students will also be hosting the complimentary 'Roast your own Marshmallow' activity for all of our visitors.

Two whisky barrels were planted by the students for the entrance way of the Wildcat Sport and Fitness Center at Mayfield High School. The students will maintain the planters and redesign with the changing of the seasons.

Throughout the school year, students participate in various life skills presentations lead by Mr. Joe Hayes, Excel TECC counselor. Students presented 'You in a Bag'. Participants were to fill a bag with 10 items they feel represent them best and explain each item to the class. The purpose of this activity is to get-to-know each other and realize that we have more in common than originally thought. What a great experience! The students owned this assignment and really put a lot of time into their presentations.

### Landscape Operations: Ed Tuhela

The Landscape Operations students are learning how to build several hardscape features. They started to build a waterfall and pond by our front sign. The waterfall will be about 5 feet tall and the pond will be able to hold various aquatic plants as well as several different species of fish. The pond should be self sustaining once the water chemistry is set. The other project is a dry-laid stone wall. Both these features are popular in today's landscapes designs.

The students are also planning on going to the FFA District 3 Landscape competition at Mill Creek Gardens in Youngstown. There the students will compete and also have the opportunity to view the gorgeous gardens the metro park has to offer. It is truly a hidden gem.

## CADD Students Participate in Several Hands-On Experiences

CADD Juniors ended the 2012-13 school year participating the fifth-annual Mouse Trap-Powered Car Design and Construction Competition. Students researched, sketched, created CADD models and drawings, and constructed cars from those drawings. After test runs and adjustments, it was time for the final runs on the last day of class. Joey Centrackio's car traveled a distance of 116 feet 6 inches to win the competition. Alfred Beckstrom, Ben Hosler and Brad Stephens all tied for the best straight line run. Students were able to experience the engineering design process and build cars from their designs in this popular hands-on project.

The 2013-14 school year is off to a great start. All Juniors returned for the Senior year, and we have a full-incoming Junior class!

For the third straight year, Computer-Aided Drafting and Design Seniors will once again collaborate with the Excel TECC Construction Trades and Environmental Education programs as a part of the 2013-14 Modular Homes Project. CADD Seniors are currently preparing preliminary designs for two homes to be constructed by the Construction Trades program. Student teams are designing single- and two-story homes to be constructed in the Construction Trades Lab. When the preliminary drawings are finalized, and the successful designs are selected, CADD Seniors will produce complete sets of construction drawings for each home. Once the homes are under construction, CADD Seniors will monitor the progress and resolve any issues our "clients" – the Construction Trades program – have. This partnership between the CADD, Construction Trades and Environmental Education programs gives our students a real-life authentic experience that could not be experienced in a single program.

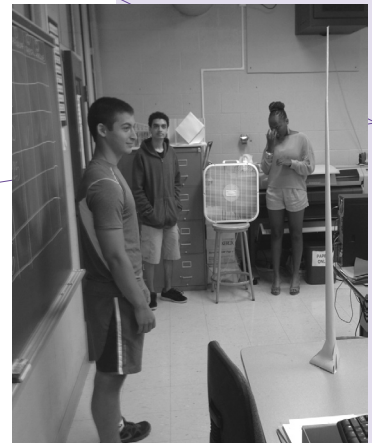
Our incoming Juniors participated in a team exercise on the second day of class named "The Newspaper Challenge." Teams of three students got a taste of the engineering design process, as they designed, prototyped and constructed newspaper towers that would need to withstand "wind" from the classroom fan. Fan speeds ranged from "normal" to "hurricane force" winds. Three of the six teams constructed towers that withstood the hurricane force winds. This was the first of several short design challenges students will participate in throughout the two-year CADD program, building their collaborative and problem-solving skills through the use of hands-on activities.

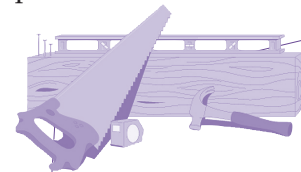

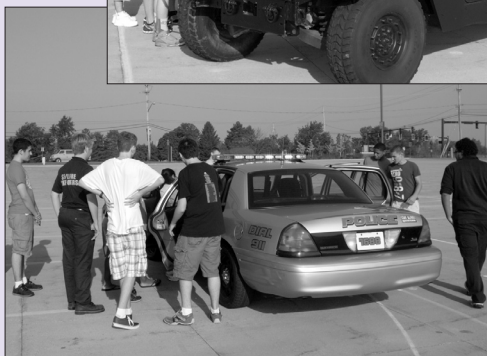

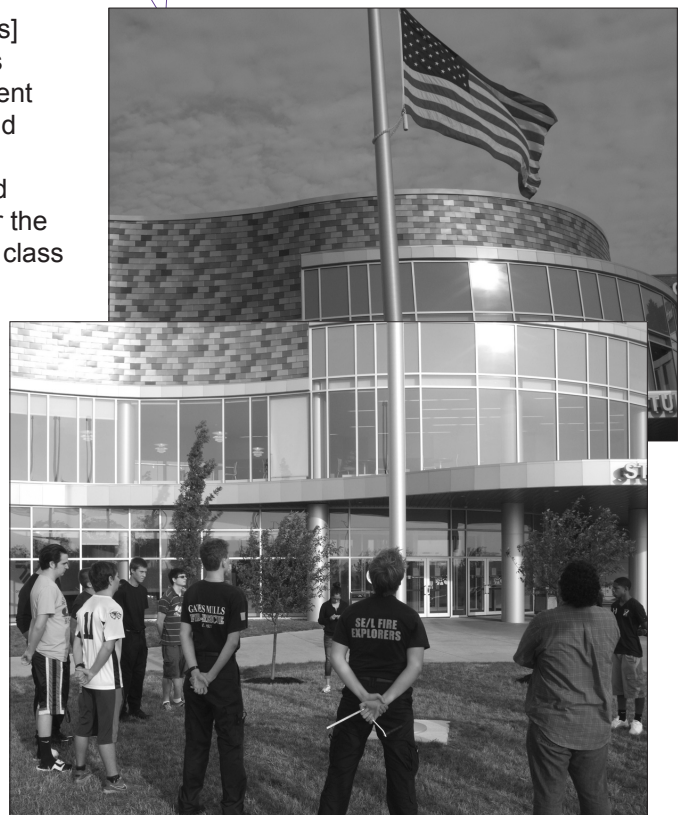

## Beachwood Marketing “Takes-Over” and “Drives” for Success

Who would have thought that as a high school senior you could work hands-on with the top radio company in the world? This year, Excel TECC's Beachwood Marketing class was approached with a unique opportunity to orchestrate and develop a new product. The students are working first hand with a successful entrepreneur, Daniel Anstandig, to help him create an app that will become a new trend in social media.

Mrs. Jean Getz' Marketing Program is made up of high achieving students that are striving for success. The students are from Chagrin Falls, Beachwood, and West Geauga High Schools. The class will be working directly with Daniel Anstandig, the CEO of Listener Driven Radio (LDR) and founder of Kiss FM's interactive music-Takeover. Daniel Anstandig was a Beachwood High School graduate and former marketing student of Mrs. Getz and a DECA state champion. Mr. Anstandig had his own radio station at the age of nine and an international business by fourteen.

This year, the marketing class will have an opportunity to help develop an app from scratch. This is something the class has never been exposed to. They will analyze ways to make this product into a unique and successful application with a social media platform. The class will be conducting focus groups all over Ohio with the teen market to discover what that specific age group is looking for in an app. The students will work with Mr. Anstandig from developing the wireframe of the app all the way to the final product.

When Ms. Dee Sturgill, Education Consultant from the ODE-Career-Technical Department found out about the project, she was extremely impressed. Ms. Sturgill stated that she would like all of the marketing programs in Ohio to participate in focus groups because it encompasses hands-on authentic learning that will emphasize immersive learning. She stated that this type of creative self-directed problem solving and higher learning would prepare students for the challenging roles in both business and in college.

Along with working with a renowned company in the music industry, the marketing class will also compete in DECA competitions. DECA is an international organization for marketing students. It prepares emerging leaders and entrepreneurs in marketing, finance, hospitality and management in high schools and colleges around the globe and has more than 190,000 high school members participating in DECA through 3,500 chapters in all 50 states and 8 countries. The students will have the opportunity to compete in the fields of business and marketing at the DECA district, state and international level against other DECA students. This will not

only be a fun opportunity, but it will also ready the students for their future in the real business world. The marketing class will be able to travel to the Nia Center / Kalahari for a “mock” contest with the hope of expanding their knowledge to attend the DECA International Contest in Atlanta, Georgia in May.

Furthermore the marketing class will be attending a DECA conference at Progressive Field to learn about the sports and entertainment industry. Later this year, the students will be attending a DECA Day with the Cleveland Cavaliers.

Every other month, the marketing class has a fundraiser to assist with the DECA Contest. This month the students will be selling Chik-fil-A sandwiches. In November, the students will begin to sell Cheesecakes for the holidays.

## Medical Technologies

The summer of 2013 was full speed ahead for the Medical Technologies students. Our June graduating 2013 Seniors were busy preparing to go to university - University of Cincinnati, University of Akron, Kent State University, OSU, Penn State, Slippery Rock, and Xavier University just to mention a few.

Three students were accepted into the Cleveland Clinic Summer Internship Program. Sponsored by the Office of Civic Education the program is a nine-week *paid* internship providing top students throughout Northeast Ohio with the opportunity to work and learn alongside nationally renowned healthcare professionals in a variety of health care fields **Jasmine Hohenfeld, Oroshay Kaiwan, and Mynor Mendez** were selected out of an applicant pool of over 500 students. As a requirement of the program all three students conducted research with clinical faculty. **Mynor Mendez** who worked on a cardiac unit, participated in research with Scott Flamm MD and Deborah Kwon MD. Their published study was *"Echocardiographic and Cardiac MRI parameters' of Patients with Systolic Heart Failure."* Mynor says of his experience with the Clinic, "This experience definitely strengthened my desire to become a physician and has caused me to work harder at achieving my goals and not giving up until I achieve what I want."

**Jasmine Hohenfeld** who interned in the Nursing Department assisted Barbara Elliot RN, CCRN with a research study in Quality Assurance, *"Improving Quality and Patient Safety through accurate Hand-Off Shift-to-Shift communication."* Jasmine says, "This experience has broadened my vision of the health care field. Being able to see how the nurses directly affect their patients has touched me in the sense that eventually I will be able to do that someday."

Senior Medical Technologies student **Oroshay Kaiwan's** published research project *"The Effect of Hyperglycemia on the Incidence of Retinopathy of Prematurity"*, demonstrated that advanced ROP (Retinopathy of Prematurity) infants have a higher glucose intolerance and tend to be more premature to gestation and weight than prematurity due to other causes. This will someday affect prenatal treatment. Oroshay states "This internship was a glimpse of my future job. By observing patients and their pain from a closer perspective, I was able to strengthen my passion for medicine."

**Nick Kamis** and **Olivia Ankrum** took their summer studies outside of Ohio. Both students were invited to attend the National Youth Leadership Forum on Medicine. Nick traveled to Washington D.C. and Olivia to Atlanta, Georgia. The Forum on Medicine's mission is to link academically talented and motivated students with medical specialists and newer clinical technologies in advanced hospital and research facilities. These high school scholars were able to experience the realities of a medical career through educational clinical

research and technology.

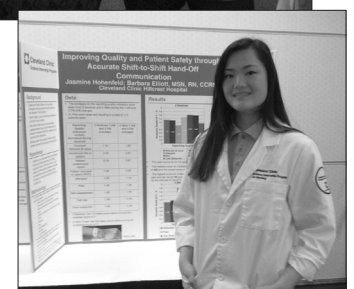
At home, **Lisa and Dana Blackwell, Ashley Peltz, Yuliya Babichuk, Nick Kamis, Sophia Amati, Michaela McLaughlin, and Cory Banko** assisted Cleveland Clinic Hillcrest and several Paramedic Units in the Hillcrest Regional Casualty Drill on August 16th. Our students portrayed disaster victims to assist in the preparation, planning and testing of Hospital and First Responders in the event of a real disaster incident. Students participating in the event Lisa and Dana Blackwell state "This experience has showed us how emergency systems work to handle a mass disaster like this."

**James Hrestak** started his senior internship this summer with the Mayfield Heights Fire Department. Jimmy rides squad with the EMT's and says "Assisting seven paramedics working on a patient during a full arrest was one of the most interesting learning experiences. Everyone had a job - intubation, chest compressions, IV meds, this is real life teamwork."
