Mayfield High School was recognized as part of U.S. News Best High Schools Rankings.

Newsweek named **Mayfield High School** among the best STEM schools in the nation.

Advanced Placement (AP) participation at Mayfield High School is 33%.

Mayfield High School Principal Jeffrey

Legan was named the 2020 Ohio Principal of the Year by the Ohio Association of Secondary School Administrators (OASSA).

Center Elementary School students utilized virtual pathways to connect with various experts around the globe. Third-grade students learned about the writing process as they connected with author, and former Center teacher, Shelley Pearsall. Kindergarten students learned about adaptations of bees as they connected with an ecologist studying these insects in Knoxville, TN. Fifth-graders studying food chains connected with a marine biologist from Harvard to learn about parasitic birds and the unique habits of an octopus.

Mayfield High School earned the 2019 State Board of Education Momentum Award.

Mayfield City Schools teamed with The Ohio State College of Education and Ecology to form a partnership to research and improve students' social and emotional learning as part of MCS's All-Access Learning curriculum. Forbes ranked Mayfield Heights as the No. 7 best and most affordable suburbs in the United States. Mayfield City Schools was rated as an A+ district as part of the evaluation.

Millridge Elementary teachers and students in grades 1 and 5 used personalized learning skills in math to choose the teaching and learning methods that best met the students' learning style. This approach gives students a choice and voice in how they learn.

By the end of the 2019-20 school year, even with time spent learning from home due to COVID-19, 82% of **Gates Mills Elementary** students were learning above grade level.

Lander Elementary was renewed as a STEM school by the Ohio Department of Education and is among a select group of schools that demonstrate a commitment to innovative learning and teaching students the principles of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics.


- The Junior Business Academy earned first place out of 37 schools at the Veale Foundation's THINK BIG Summit at Case Western Reserve University.

Supporting Students, Staff and Community During the Pandemic

In the wake of COVID-19

and the State's stay-at-home order, our teachers mobilized and took control, shifting from a traditional learning style to remote, online learning.

1:1 Device Handout: The district has provided 4,600 devices to every student K-12 in response to the need for online learning.

Excel TECC had 101 students who earned the National Technical Honor Society award, including 33 MHS students.



CEVEC teachers and staff created 17 elective courses, including financial literacy, self advocacy, and employability empowerment for inperson and virtual students using the 16 instructional CEVEC standards.

Mayfield High School's Mock Trial team qualified for the state tournament for the first time in 25 years.

Mayfield students are our leaders of tomorrow. In fact, the qualities employers most look for in recent graduates are leadership skills. Participating in a leadership development experience can help students advance their educational and personal development.

Gates Mills Elementary School had an amazing year supporting The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society through Pennies for Patients. Students and staff raised \$1,083 in funds that will assist not only patients in Northern Ohio, but across the nation.

As part of the annual day of giving, **Mayfield Middle School students** and staff rake neighborhood yards across our community.

Center and Gates Mills Elementary students teamed together to design and create a whole school rock garden focused on spreading kindness. All students and staff will decorate a rock with a word that encompasses kindness and our fifth-grade students will design a space to display the collection near the front entrance of the buildings.



Gates Mills Elementary spent a week while learning from home honoring heroes (nurses, doctors, police) by writing letters and making pictures and signs to show appreciation.

Parent and Community Involvement

Parent, family and community partnerships are the foundation of a strong community. When our schools, parents, families and communities work together, our students succeed.



The Mayfield Green Tie Gala raised a record \$53,000 in February, 2020. This outstanding event supports projects such as the Mayfield Mobile Innovation Lab. Since 2016, Mayfield business and community supporters have raised \$270,000 at the Gala.

A show of community support - 1,000 yard signs to honor the Class of 2020 were graciously donated by a local company to show support to our students, staff and families during these unprecedented times.

Mayfield fight song - MHS Marching Band Director Brad Treiber and our Wildcat Band members created a video in honor of our frontline workers.

Members of our Food Service team worked to create lunches for students during the pandemic when schools weren't in session.

The Excel TECC Cosmetology Salon in Highland Heights provides clients with haircuts, manicures, pedicures to assist the students in preparation for the state cosmetology exam.

A scholarship was set up to be given to a CEVEC student in the memory of Millridge teacher Robyn Friedman, who passed away November 27, 2019. T-shirts were sold with the words **"Team Robyn"** on the left sleeve.

The Mayfield Village Quilters continued the tradition with Center Elementary fourth graders to teach students how to quilt. Quilts created by the students were donated to area hospitals and local veterans.

Mayfield High School hosted about 40 senior adult residents for the **Senior Citizen Sampler.** Students led the program, which included lunch, a tour of the high school and Mayfield Innovation Center and a preview of Chicago, The High School Edition.

Graduation Caravan: An in-car only Graduation Caravan honored our Mayfield Class of 2020. The Caravan was in partnership with our four communities to celebrate the Class of 2020 while maintaining safety for the students, families and community.





Mayfield City Schools, Gates Mills Village and the Gates Mills Historical Society

celebrated the 50th anniversary of the United States Coast Guard Station which was located on the grounds of the Gates Mills Environmental Education Center from 1941-1969. According to history, the U.S. Coast Guard Station was located there as it is the highest elevation in Cuyahoga County. When the station closed, the property was deeded to the Mayfield City School District which has operated the Excel TECC/Gates Mills Environmental Education Center there ever since.

Innovation

Traditional classrooms are a model of the past. Gone are students learning for hours in lines of desks staring at a teacher writing on a blackboard. Mayfield teachers and students instead enjoy the benefits of flexible seating and learning spaces to capture creativity, problem solve, collaborate, communicate and think critically – all of the tools necessary to prepare our students for college, career and life.

The Mayfield Innovation

Center, which opened in the fall 2015, offers STEAM2M classes, multiple pathways and innovative opportunities to all students in all grades. High School courses include Principles of Biomedical Science, Intro to Engineering Design, Human Body Systems, Principles of Engineering, Cybersecurity, Computer Integrated Manufacturing, to name a few. At our Fab Lab, students can experience 3-D printing, laser cutting, Makerbots and virtual reality equipment.





Mayfield High School unveiled its new 6,500-square-foot innovative space designed for MHS seniors enrolled in The Option. The space provides students with more access to customized and personalized learning.

The Millridge Media / STEAM2M Collaboration supports the path of personalized learning for every student to reach his or her greatest potential. The new learning spaces empower students and teachers with environments to work and learn individually and collaboratively.

Mayfield Middle School updated its courtyard with new outdoor furniture made of all recycled, weather resistant materials. MMS students and staff also have access to a new courtyard greenhouse for science and wellness classes.

Mayfield Middle School offers its students and teachers multiple areas and multiple environments to meet the needs of each students' learning style. The Mayfield Middle School Innovative Learning Center allows teachers to meet students where they are as

learners and give them the skills they need to be their most successful.

All Mayfield schools offer Innovation Labs which allow students to create, innovate, collaborate and think critically using multiple hands-on technologies.

Supported in part by the Wildcat Community Foundation, the **Mayfield Mobile Innovation Lab** gives students and community members a chance to experience the world of Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Math and Medicine.

Teaching and learning is enhanced across the district with such **tech tools** as schoolology, Seesaw, Illuminate and a plethora of learning apps at our **Fab Lab** students can experience 3-D printing, laser cutting, Makerbox, and virtual reality equipment.



Our robust technology has helped our students and staff to stay connected and advance the learning both in person and remotely. During the stay-at-home order, teachers, staff and students also created video messages and held Zoom gatherings to stay connected while apart.

Mayfield City Schools has a solid track record of strong fiscal management. We are committed to enacting a sensible and efficient budget for taxpayers, while still protecting the classroom and the high-quality programs our community values.

A Voice at the State Dr. Keith Kelly and the Mayfield Board of Education continue to speak on behalf of public education with local, state and federal legislators and representatives to address education bills and policies to benefit students and teachers.

Contract with the Community: Promises Made. Promises Kept.

Our facilities are very well taken care of, and they are continually improving. Renovated spaces, furniture and technology match our vision for teaching. The collaboration on redesign of all of our improving facilities have included staff and students. Here are some results from just this past year:

- Renovations and improvements of learning and dining spaces at Millridge Elementary.
- Partnered with Mayfield Village and a local business owner to find a creative and collaborative solution to change the entrance at Mayfield High School in an effort to alleviate traffic flow concerns on Wilson Mills Road. This was made possible, in part, through the sale of the Old Schoolhouse.
- Renovations of the former Construction Trades workshop at MHS into a 6,500-square-foot entrepreneurial learning space.

Other noteworthy investments include:

- New MMS cafeteria also used for learning and new "Our House" arena
 - MHS auditorium upgrades
 - Purchase and renovation of Excel TECC construction trades building in Willoughby
 - New Excel TECC cosmetology facility at Alpha Park/Highland Heights
 - Plans to align Miner Road with MHS driveway
 - Upgraded safety in all buildings with the integration of the RAPTOR Visitor Management System
 - 130 security cameras have been installed across the District for enhanced interior and exterior security at all of our schools
 - New Mayfield preschool location at MHS.

Stretching the Levy

Cycle Voters passed a levy for the schools in 2016 and because of good financial management, Mayfield Schools will be able to make this money last six years instead of four years.

State and National Recognition for Fiscal Responsibility

For more than 20 years, Mayfield Schools has been recognized for excellence in financial reporting and for the past four years, Treasurer Scott Snyder received a special State Auditor's award for a perfect report.

We must continue to:

Seek out efficiencies in operations in order to deliver high-quality education at a great value to residents. This is especially true during these times of economic uncertainty.


Athletics and Activities
