#### What is College Credit Plus?

College Credit Plus is Ohio's dual enrollment program where students earn both high school and college credit at the same time

- Students may apply to any public or participating private college
- Students may apply and take courses at multiple colleges



## Who's Eligible?

- Students in grades 7-12
- Ohio residents
- Students who meet academic eligibility standards (determined by the State)
- Students who meet the admissions requirements for the college/university (may be different for each college)
- Students who are "College Ready"



## What does it mean to be "College-Ready"?

#### More than just academically ready

- Emotional and social transition
- Meeting college expectations
- Time management and organizational skills
- Some college classes have content that is oriented toward a mature or adult student. College instructors will not modify the course content for CCP students.
  - Ohio requires new CCP students & parents to complete a Mature Content Permission Slip



## How is College <u>Different</u> from High School?

	High School	College
Tests	Weekly or end of chapter	Fewer in number, but cover more material
Study Time	1 to 3 hours per day	2-3 hours per credit hours
<b>Graded Work</b>	Numerous quizzes, tests, and homework	Fewer tests & assignments, but worth more points
Learning	Information provided mostly in-class. Out-of-class research is minimal	More independent thinking, longer writing assignments, & out-of-class research
Responsibility	Daily verbal reminders in class	Email reminders, checking courses online daily
Attendance & Class Participation	Required, parents are notified if a student is absent	Attendance policy is determined by instructor, but no one is notified if a student is absent
Role of Parents	Parents are involved, working closely with teachers and counselors	The college views the student as an independent decisionmaker



#### **FERPA**

- The "Family Education Rights and Privacy Act" (FERPA)
  - Protects student education records
    - Parents do not have access to student's academic records
    - Colleges reserve the right to communicate student record information with appropriate high school officials who have an "educational need to know"
    - "Permission to Release Information Form" students written consent to share information with a third party
      - This will give parents a limited access to their student's records



#### Benefits of CCP

- Students can:
  - Earn high school & college credits at the same time
  - Get a "head start" on career plans
  - Start & potentially complete a degree or certificate program
  - Understand the expectations of college life
  - Save tuition & textbook costs
  - Have more class opportunities & a flexible schedule



#### Intent to Participate Form

- Students must complete the Intent to Participate form and submit it to their high school by April 1
- This is the only way CCP students can receive state funding
- Not a binding contract & students can decide not to participate even if they sign it.
- This form is separate than the college application
- Some expenses are not covered (Ex: parking, transportation, calculators, optional materials, etc.)
- On the Intent to Participate form, students indicate a tentative plan to use Option A or Option B for payment of the College Credit Plus courses

Option A	Option B
<ul> <li>The family/student will "self pay" for college course at the standard rate of tuition, fees, and textbooks</li> <li>Students can choose to earn college credit and high school credit OR only college credit (students must inform the high school of their choice of credit for courses)</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>"Default" or standard option for CCP</li> <li>All college course tuition, fees, and textbooks will be paid for by the state of Ohio (supported by the school's foundation funds and the college's funds)</li> <li>Students will earn college credit and high school credit</li> <li>Private colleges may charge students a small fee per credit hour</li> </ul>




#### How Many Credits Can Students Take?

- Up to 30 credits per academic year, includes high school classes:
  - Calculation: 30 ( \_\_\_\_\_ high school units x 3) = \_\_\_\_ (max CCP credits)
  - Example: 30 (3 high school units x 3) = 21 CCP credits
- College classes can range from 1 to 5 credits
- If a student enrolls in more than 30 credits, they can either:
  - Drop the course (during the 100% refund period) or
  - Pay for the <u>entire</u> course (including tuition, fees, books) at the college's standard rates
- Lifetime maximum credits per student is 120



#### When Can Students Take Classes?



- Summer is the lead academic term
- Student athletes should know summer term CCP courses cannot count for athletic eligibility for that academic year



#### Where Can Students Take Classes?







\*The option to take courses at the high school is only available if the high school has partnered with a college or university to offer courses at the high school



#### What Courses can Students Take?

- Students must meet prerequisites for all courses they take.
- Students must complete their first 15 credits in Level I courses
  - These are transferable to public Ohio universities
  - See College/University's website for a list of Level I courses
- Students can take courses that:
  - Fulfill high school graduation requirements
    - Students must work with high school counselors to ensure they are meeting any mandatory testing or other high school requirements
  - Part of a career pathway that interests them
  - Part of a major or degree requirement



#### Non-Allowable Courses

- Private applied courses with one-on-one instruction
  - Example: guitar, piano, etc.
- Courses with high fees
- Study abroad courses
- Physical education courses
  - Example: yoga, weight-lifting, etc.
- Pass/Fail graded courses
- Remedial courses or sectarian/religious courses

#### Grades & GPA

- CCP grades earned in college courses are the same grades that will appear on the high school transcript
- If a student fails or withdraws from the course, the college transcript and high school transcript will reflect the student's final grade.
- If students do not earn a passing grade or withdraw too late from college courses, the high school may require students/families\* to reimburse the tuition that the district paid
- Grades will be factored into the high school and college GPA
- If a high school uses a weighted grading scale for Advanced Placement or Honors courses in a subject area, CCP courses in the same subject area will be weighted using the same scale
- Students must successfully complete the courses in order to earn the credit
- CCP grades/courses stay on the student's college transcript permanently

\*If a student is considered "economically disadvantaged", a school may not seek reimbursement



## CCP Probation & Dismissal

Probation	Dismissal
<ul> <li>A student will be placed on CCP Probation if they earn less than a cumulative 2.0 GPA in CCP courses or withdraws from 2 or more courses in one academic term</li> <li>When on CCP Probation, the student may only enroll in one CCP course for one college semester and may not enroll in a college course in the same subject in which they previously earned a D, F, or W grade</li> <li>Appeals*: students may submit an appeal to retake a course</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>If a student on CCP Probation does not increase their CCP GPA to a 2.0 or above during the probation semester, they will be placed on CCP Dismissal</li> <li>While on CCP Dismissal, students may not enroll in any CCP courses</li> <li>Appeals*: students may submit an appeal within 5 days of being dismissed, or wait until the end of the CCP Dismissal semester</li> </ul>

\*Each high school must have a policy describing the process for appeals



#### What <u>Support Services</u> are Available?

- High school guidance counselor
- College advisors/counselors
- Colleges provide the same academic supports to CCP students as they do traditional students
  - Learning Center/Tutoring
  - Library Access/Research Databases
  - Advising/Counseling
  - Accommodations (IEP or 504 Plans)



## Will my Credits <u>Transfer</u>?

- Most courses will transfer, especially from one public college to another public college
- Students must check with colleges to confirm transferability
- Visit transfercredit.ohio.gov or transferology.com for more resources



#### How can students <u>participate</u>?

- Step 1: Intent to Participate form
- Step 2: Apply for admission
- Step 3: College entrance exam/GPA
- Step 4: Meet with college advisor & high school counselor
- Step 5: CCP Authorization form signed by school counselor or notify counselor of registered courses

#### Step 2: Apply for admission

- Students must apply for CCP admission on the college website.
- Contact the college directly to learn about their processes, policies, procedures, paperwork, and deadlines.
- Colleges make the final decision on student's admission.



## Step 3: Criteria for student eligibility

A student is eligible for the "College Credit Plus" program if the student meets one of the following criteria:

- Obtains a remediation-free score on one of the standard assessment exams, such as
  - ACT
  - SAT
  - Accuplacer (Each college has different exam requirements per assessment)
- Has a cumulative unweighted high school grade point average of at least 3.00
- Has a cumulative unweighted high school grade point average of at least 2.75 but less than 3.00 and received an "A" or "B" grade in a relevant high school course.
  - Final eligibility is determined by the college/university



#### Step 4: Meet with college advisor

Once the student is determined eligible to participate, they will:

- Submit a CCP permission form from the college/university
- Attend a New Student Orientation
- Discuss course options with the college advisor directly.
- Confirm with Mayfield school counselor any intentions on meeting specific high school graduation credits



#### Step 5: Registration

#### Meet with MHS counselor to:

- Discuss registered CCP courses
- Confirm CCP courses will satisfy high school graduation requirements.
- Scheduling conflicts and questions
- Sign off on CCP course registration form (if applicable)



#### MHS CCP Courses

Lakeland Community College courses offered at MHS:

- ENGL 1110 English Composition I
- ENGL 1120 English Composition II
- PEHR 1750 Personal Health

Courses taught by Mayfield staff on Mayfield's campus during regularly scheduled periods.



## CCP ENGL 1110 English Composition I

**Grades 10-12** 

Semester Course – 3 college credits 1 high school credit

Prerequisite: Must be accepted to Lakeland CC

This course focuses on the writing process and on the composition of expository writing assignments, including personal, informational, and critical essays. Students will read and analyze expository and imaginative texts (fiction, nonfiction, poetry, or drama). Because of duplication in course content, students who have taken ENGL 1110 English Composition I (B) should not take this course. (3 contact hours)



#### CCP ENGL 1120 English Composition II

**Grades 10-12** 

Semester Course – 3 college credits 1 high school credit

Prerequisite: ENGL 1110 or ENGL 1111

This college course analyzes argumentative strategies, models, and texts. Students will focus on the research process: identifying sources through electronic and print-based research strategies, evaluating research materials, and integrating and synthesizing research material. The course culminates in the production of multiple argumentative compositions. (3 contact hours)



#### CCP PEHR 1750 Personal Health

**Grades 10-12** 

Semester Course – 3 college credits 1 high school credit

Prerequisite: Must be accepted to Lakeland CC

This course includes topical information that enables students to develop a healthy lifestyle of optimal fitness and wellness. The course emphasizes critical thinking on contemporary health issues and includes discussion of fitness (strength/aerobic), nutrition, stress, relationships, heart disease, chronic and infectious diseases, cancer, smoking, alcohol, drugs, disease prevention, psychological health, parenting, aging, and environmental and safety issues and concerns.



#### MHS <u>CCP Courses</u>

#### Steps to participate in CCP courses at MHS:

- Schedule in IC Academic Planner
- Submit Intent to Participate Form
- Be eligible for CCP based on GPA/assessment exam scores
- Apply to Lakeland & send transcript
- Attend Lakeland's orientation
- Submit Mature Content Permission Slip to LCC

#### \*Everything completed by April 1st



## <u>Advanced Placement vs. CCP</u>

#### **AP**

- College credit earned when student scores a level 3 or higher on AP exam.
- AP credit earned is on high school transcript only.
- Can take as many AP courses as the student's schedule allows.
- Credit may be transferred to any Ohio public institution of higher education.
- Cost to take AP exam.

#### CCP

- College credit earned by passing course.
- Courses are reported on both college and high school transcript.
- Limited to 30 credits hours per school year.
- Many entry level courses are transferable to any Ohio public institution of higher education.
- Tuition free UNLESS student fails a course.





## **CCP Eligibility Requirements at Lakeland!**

CCP students must meet the college readiness standards for English

Students entering 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup>, or 12<sup>th</sup> grades with an unweighted, cumulative High School GPA of 3.0 or above

OR

**ACT English - 18** 

<u>OR</u>

SAT Evidence-Based Reading & Writing - 480

<u>OR</u>

**Next-Generation Writing Test - 263** 



- Students entering the 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>, or 9<sup>th</sup>
  grade must take the Accuplacer
  placement test.
  - FREE test prep recourses are on Lakeland's website
